



Every two years St Mary's has a Summer Festival with lots of attractions over a very full week.


There is a Flower Festival in St Mary's Church, Ponteland, and the church looks stunning. This year the theme is the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible, the Authorised Version, and the displays will reflect bible verses in the old language.

The King James Bible theme continues in a Marquee in the Vicarage Garden, where the national exhibition from the University of Sheffield will be on display, along with work from Richard Coates' School, and a display by Ponteland Local History Society reflecting Ponteland 400 years ago. There are also guided tours of the church and an evening of railway films.

Northumbrian Artists of Today exhibit in the Church Hall. Paintings by some of the leading Northumbrian artists, including people from Ponteland itself, are all for sale.

There are three musical events - the Baliffgate Singers, Katherine White and Alison Shiel, and an organ recital by Shaun Turnball. Ponteland Library is involved this year with a talk "Monkey business at a medieval abbey" and a morning of Circus Skills with children in the Vicarage Marquee (before the displays go up!)

Refreshments are available throughout the week. There are special Church Services at 10am and 6.30pm on Sunday July 31, and The Rt Revd Frank White, Assistant Bishop of Newcastle, is coming to celebrate Communion at 10am on Wednesday August 3.



River Works

The Council had obtained preliminary advice from consultants in relation to various defects associated with the River Pont. These included cracking of the brick coping beside Waitrose bridge, undermining of abutments to footbridges, erosion of the river banks due to animals entering the river, scour of the river banks by flood events and scour near to the footbridge. In order to progress these works, further negotiations were required with the Environment Agency and schemes were to be prepared to enable works to rectify these problems to proceed to tender stage. The abutment undermining works were, however, urgent and it was suggested that this should be processed as a matter of some urgency and the use of sandbags could be carried out relatively quickly. The permanent works would require the removal of the bridge deck which would mean that the bridge deck reconstruction and the underpinning could be let as a single contract next year. Funding would need to be included in the budget for next year. The Council agreed to proceed with the design works and the temporary urgent repairs to the bridge abutments

Redesign of Footbridge Decks - Ponteland Park

The Council recently considered and agreed a report relating to the replacement of the footbridges in the park in the near future. As part of this process, detailed construction drawings were required and a sum was included within the budget for this year to enable this work to be carried out. The costs involved in the design

work were outlined and the Council agreed to appoint A J Davies as structural engineer to provide working drawings for the replacement of the bridge deck to the footbridges in the car park.

Annual Audit of Accounts for 2010/11

The Clerk presented a report on the audit of accounts for 2010/11. The Council's records for the year have been examined by the Internal Auditor who is satisfied with the information provided and had no comments to make.

Projects List

A list of projects included within the budget for 2011/12 was produced. Some were already underway, such as the CCTV which was nearing completion, and improvements to the planters at Broadway shopping centre. The Council agreed a project suggested by the Friends of Ponteland Park for improvements to an area of the park where recent footpath work had been carried out.

Budget 2012/13 Wish List

Councillors were asked to submit any items, with approximate costs if possible to the Mayor and the Clerk and a meeting would be held to discuss these for possible inclusion in the budget for next year.

Environment Working Party

The Council considered the report of the

meeting of the above Working Party held on May 23. Recommendations were approved relating to the display of 'No dogs allowed' signs in the Callerton Lane play area following complaints by users. It was also agreed to carry out some repairs/refurbishment at the Twizell Place play area. The Council also gratefully accepted an offer from Friends of Ponteland Park to donate another picnic bench for the picnic area in the park and the Council would place a further litter bin in this area.

Northumberland County Council report

Coun Richard Dodd stated that he would like the Town Council to be very involved in the formulation of the Local Development Framework. The documents would be sent out for consultation within the next two months. Some communities were well advanced in the formulation of parish or town plans and it was important that Ponteland followed this example to avoid a plan being imposed by NCC. Coun Peter Jackson stated that a review of how the Area Committees were running in relation to parish and town councils was being carried out. It was felt that the two West Area Committees had performed well and they would be used as a template for the remainder of the county. The County Council is reviewing broadband provision across the county and it was reported that Ponteland was high on the list to have super fast broadband facilities.

This report is based on the minutes of Ponteland Town Council's meeting held on June 8.

Darras Hall dancer overcomes serious injury to win national title

Darras Hall dancer Bethany Whittle has overcome a serious back injury to be named Miss Dance of Great Britain 2011.

The 20-year-old was told she could be left wheelchair-bound if she risked dancing again after an operation to repair a prolapsed disc – a rare condition for someone so young.

The devastating warning came after Bethany had started to suffer back problems while a student at the Phil Winston Theatre Works in Blackpool, aged just 16.

But after surgery at Newcastle General Hospital and a lengthy period of rehabilitation in which she was unable to undertake physical exercise for months, Bethany vowed to get back on stage.

The former Ponteland Community High School pupil began competing again this year and after performing on the popular BBC1 Saturday night show So You Think You Can Dance, she has now beat off competition from 48 elite performers to be named Miss Dance of Great Britain 2011.

Her victory was, quite aptly, in front of 3,000 spectators at the Winter Gardens in Blackpool, the town she was based in when she had the shock news about her back injury.

Speaking on route to London, where she is hoping to secure work as a professional dancer, Bethany said: "I started training again two years ago but it's been very gradual – it's only this year that I've got fully back into it.

"But with everything happening it's been like a whirlwind. I only just missed out on the last ten in So You Think You Can Dance but appeared in the auditions. It was a really good experience and (judge) Nigel Lythgoe is such a lovely person – so down to earth. He said I should come back next year."

Bethany, whose parents Paul and Karen and brother Ben live in The Rise, has been dancing since the age of three and trained at the Elaine Milbourne Theatre Dance School in Throckley. She now hopes to obtain commercial work or appear in the West End.

PONTELAND TEENAGER CALLED UP FOR NATIONAL TRIALS BY ECB



Ponteland schoolboy cricketer Alisdair Appleby has been selected for national trials by the English Cricket Board.

The 13-year-old, who attends The King's School in Tynemouth, plays as a top all-rounder for both Benwell Hill and Northumberland County Cricket Club's under-13 teams.

If he passes the gruelling trials later this year, he will receive a programme of world-class training to prepare him for possible national cricketing stardom.

Alisdair said: "I'm really happy because this is another step towards my dream of playing for England. My grandparents bought my first bat when I was three and I've been hooked ever since."

The youngster was recommended for trials by Northumberland County CC coach, Dan Shurben, who said: "He is a great all-round player and one of the best for his age. We've been really impressed."

King's master in charge of cricket Phil Nicholson added: "This is a fantastic opportunity for any young player, but especially for Alisdair who works so hard. He's a stylish left-handed batsman and a strong wicket keeper too. He fully deserves this recognition."

Darras Hall businessman looks to build rankings at Burgham

He took over the reins at Tyneside property and construction business Metnor over a decade ago. But now Stephen Rankin is preparing to overcome an altogether different set of hurdles.

For the well known North-East business leader has revealed he is to compete at Burgham Horse Trials next month.

Stephen, chairman and chief executive of the Killingworth-based Metnor Group, took up Eventing last year after attending Hexham Horse Trials as a spectator, and has competed at events across the country since.

The 47-year-old, of Darras Hall, Ponteland, said he was looking forward to competing in the BE100 class at Burgham and paid tribute to Northumberland businessmen Semore Kurdi and Sunil Mehra, who are supporting the event.

He said: "I think it's absolutely fantastic. I'm delighted that Semore has such an interest in our sport, building a new cross-country course at Burgham. Eventers from this region have always had to travel as far as Skipton, Bishop Burton and the Midlands.

"Now, with Hexham and Burgham on the calendar, you get quite a nice variety of courses which means you can just about Event every weekend through June, July and August in an 80-mile radius.

"With the extra pre-Badminton Advanced qualifying event at Burgham next year youngsters coming through will be able to see the best riders competing here in the North-East, which will also attract a lot of visitors to the region."

Stephen will compete on his nine-year-



old 16'3 gelding Tomorrows Dream, which he has already ridden this year in BE90 classes at Hexham, Bishop Burton, Richmond, Northallerton and Eden Valley. He has enjoyed early success in his short riding career, achieving 3rd place at Askham Bryan last October, and now he's moving up to BE100 in time for Burgham next month

Burgham Horse Trials Director Semore Kurdi said: "I'm delighted to hear Stephen is competing at Burgham and I hope he does well. We have received a lot of support and feedback from both the equestrian and business communities for what we are trying to achieve at Burgham, and with just a month to go we're looking forward to putting on a great event."

"Abusive" parents face action over dangerous driving

A Ponteland councillor has vowed to take action against "abusive" parents who drive dangerously during the twice daily school run into the village.

Northumberland County Councillor Richard Dodd met with the headteachers of Ponteland First School and Richard Coates CE Middle School, highways chiefs and concerned parents to discuss measures to address the problem of irresponsible driving.

New enforcement measures are now being investigated after efforts by both teaching staff and other parents to prevent driving on and blocking pavements met with abuse.

Coun Dodd said he had already spent £20,000 from his personal allowance for small schemes on yellow lines, new parking bays for elderly residents in the neighbouring bungalows and a new zebra crossing – all on Thornhill Road.

But after numerous exchanges between parents who walk to school and the parents being accused of dangerous driving, the meeting was held in an endeavour to find a solution

Coun Dodd said: "The problem persists by about 20 or so parents who I believe do not live around here, parking on the pavements, driving along the pavements dropping off at the gates, using the bus lane, turning dangerously and in the main being abusive when challenged.

"I would like more enforcement so I am looking at extending the yellow line down as far as the shops. I am also going to look at

getting some planters that will be placed on the pavement and filled with flowers - it will make the place look better and prevent this blocking of the pavement. If more engineering is needed I will try and fund this.

"It is frustrating that people come to our village/town to use our excellent schools (the other schools have similar problems) and pay residents back with bad driving habits. Some I am sure would drive into the classroom if they could. It is a priority to get this sorted."

In a joint statement, Lynn Blain, Headteacher of Ponteland First, and Paul Rusby, Headteacher of Richard Coates Middle, said: "Ponteland First School and Richard Coates C of E Middle School work closely together on many matters and we have worked collaboratively to improve traffic issues around our school site with Councillor Dodd, Northumberland County Council, local businesses, Northumbria Police, local residents and parents.

"We are very grateful to the majority of parents who now park away from Thornhill Road which is helping ensure pupil safety as they access our school site. We continue to encourage all parents to park with consideration for local residents and the safety of our school communities."

Social worker Janet Dakers, whose son Matthew attends Ponteland First School, attended the meeting and has also contacted MP Guy Opperman to see what action can be taken.

She said: "It personally makes me very angry indeed that there is no safe route into Matthew's school. In my opinion it is only a matter of time before a child is seriously injured or even killed by this situation. It seems to me that each individual agency is too concerned about the cost of any changes – but what cost would you put on a child's life?"

She wants highways chiefs to take a similar approach to Hartlepool Borough Council, which has targeted parents parking illegally using a new camera car. The vehicle automatically takes photographs of offenders and a $\mathfrak{L}70$ fine is posted out to the driver after using automatic number plate recognition. If paid within 14 days, the fine is reduced to $\mathfrak{L}35$

Since its launch in May, 438 drivers have been prosecuted and there has been a considerable drop in illegal parking around schools in the town.

Former Mayor awarded MBE in Queen's Birthday Honours

Two tireless community servants from Ponteland have been awarded MBEs in the Queen's Birthday Honours.

Regarding the breed of dog concerned, they may have been Pointers. They were running as a pair. One was brown, and the other white with dark markings. I would like to know of any other sightings.

CLUB BOWLS UP QUARTER CENTURY


Members of Dalton Carpet Bowling Club have celebrated the organisation's 25th anniversary.

Ponteland Town Centre Regeneration Scheme: project update

The first Ponteland update in the April 2011 issue of Pont News & Views advised that significant progress had been made on the regeneration project to deliver a new shopping centre and community hub to the village.

In the update it was indicated that subject to the Development Agreement proceeding as expected it may be possible to go out to a Public Consultation on MK Partnership's proposals sometime in the period June to September 2011.

However information given by Northumberland County personnel at a recent project meeting stated that whilst good progress is being made on all matters pertaining to a draft Development Agreement between

Northumberland County Council and the MK Partnership, this process is not yet completed.

Authorisation/ratification must also be obtained from County Councillors at various management

committees to this Agreement which, due to the meeting programme, will take the process into the Autumn.

As a result the MK Partnership cannot now put forward their proposals for the Town Centre scheme until later in the year.

When any further information is known to the Community Partnership, it will be published in Pont News & Views.



Former headteacher no relation to building firm

Henderson Court, a good choice of name for the new McCarthy & Stone care facility growing rapidly on the site of the former first school.

But, a little confusion between Henderson the builder and Henderson the head teacher in last month's story in Pont News. They were not related at all.

Edward Henderson started the firm in 1840 when he lived in Eland Grange which fronts the North Road. He was a joiner, coffin maker and undertaker and he used the land behind his house as a storage yard. The junior school was built next to his yard.

The family firm prospered for many years but in 1960 it went bust and the yard was taken over to build an extension for the then junior school. A kitchen, hall and staff room were built. Molly Henderson, the only local survivor of the family firm, worked as a secretary for them after the war, and now in her 90s, lives at Abbeyfield.

Kenneth Henderson, a gentle and enthusiastic teacher was appointed head in 1975, a post he held for 19 years. According to a member of staff at the time he brought out the best in everyone.


